The British West Indies Regiment (BWIR) In The Great War





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This booklet forms part of the wider heritage project; *The British West Indies Regiment (BWIR) and The King's African Rifles (KAR) In The Great War*. A touring photographic exhibition visiting various locations across Milton Keynes and Aylesbury, as well as Talks and Workshops have supplemented the project which commemorates the Centenary of The Great War. The project has run across 2018-2019.

The booklet focuses on The British West Indies Regiment (BWIR). The information and archival material illustrates the sacrifices, contributions and courage of the soldiers who served on the side of The British Empire, serving as Soldiers, Porters and Carriers.

It is by no means an exhaustive literature on the subject. This project has been made possible through the support provided by The Heritage Lottery Fund.

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Introduction

The British West Indies Regiment (BWIR) played a significant role in the First World War. A separate black unit within the British Army, where no black soldier was to rise above the rank of Sergeant. The regiment was formed in May 1915 whereby small units of black soldiers were brought together at the North Camp in Seaford, Sussex.

Of the 15,204 men the BWIR had registered, 66% of these had come from Jamaica, however recruits came from most of the West Indies islands, British Guyana, British Honduras and from Caribbean communities in Panama, Canada and the USA.

Throughout its history, the regiment was involved in a number of campaigns in the West Indies and Africa, also taking part in the First World War where it served in the Middle East and East Africa. 86 medals for bravery were won.

The 1st and 2nd Battalions served mainly in Egypt and Palestine, the 3rd—7th Battalions served in France and Flanders, and the 5th Battalion acting as reserve draft unit. The 8th and 9th Battalions also served in France and Flanders, before being transferred to Italy in 1918, while the 10th and 11th Battalions also served in France and Italy.

The Tower Hill Memorial, London cemetery contains the graves of 98 Jamaican Commonwealth war dead of the 1914-18 war.



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


